JAZZ NOTES

The prelude for this morning's service is from "The Majesty of the Blues", an album by the legendary New Orleans trumpeter Wynton Marsalis. The set entitled "New Orleans Function" features musicians in a style influenced by the traditional New Orleans brass band. The music reflects a jazz funeral with a dirge-like movement ("The Death of Jazz"), followed by a spoken word sermon preached at the graveyard, and concluding with the resurrection of jazz ("Oh, But on the Third Day"). "Happy Feet Blues" mirrors the New Orleans second line parades often associated with weddings and funerals.

The jazz anthem "Joe Avery's Blues" simply known as "Second Line" was written by New Orleans trombonist and bandleader Joseph "Kid" Avery. The tune is based on a simple 12-bar blues form and has become a popular music standard at second line parades.

"Chelsea Bridge" is a beautiful ballad written for Duke Ellington by Billy Strayhorn. "Take the A Train" and "Lush Life" may be Strayhorn's best known compositions, but "Chelsea Bridge" easily ranks as one of his greatest. Unlike tune-based jazz and pop, "Chelsea Bridge" is classical in its integration of melody and harmony. It has been described as an impressionist miniature, more like Debussy than Ellington.

The offertory "Morning" is a Latin jazz standard composed by Clare Fischer, an American pianist, composer, bandleader, and arranger. After graduating from Michigan State University, Fischer worked with "The Hi-Lo's" in the late 1950's and went on to collaborate with Donald Byrd and Dizzy Gillespie. He later became known for his Latin and boss's nova recordings in the 1960's. "Morning" made it's debut on his 1965 LP Manteca! which was his first recording conceived entirely in the Afro-Cuban idiom.

"When the Saints Go Marching In" was recorded by Louis Armstrong in 1938 and remains jazz band's most requested tune. It has been particularly associated with New Orleans and still often accompanies funeral parades. As the coffin moves to the cemetery, the music is in the style of a dirge. Following the burial, the style abruptly switches to an upbeat rendition reflecting the transcendence from death to life everlasting.
